#### Inside "The Wardrobe"

Audiences were invited to get caught up in the sweep of British history with KPS Drama's latest production, **The Wardrobe**, adapted from Sam Holcroft's acclaimed historical play commissioned by the National Theatre.

Set against the backdrop of seven centuries – from The Black Plague to the dawn of the Industrial Revolution – it reveals stories of young people from all walks of life who find sanctuary inside a centuries-old wardrobe.

Drama teacher Ms Kenyon and her cast, musicians and crew of talented students deftly navigated the complexities of their respective eras, offering an unforgettable theatrical performance for our school community, brought to life by the dedication, creativity, and passion of an outstanding collaborative team effort.



## The Big Read


This term, tutor time on a Thursday morning was transformed into **The Big Read**, with students and teachers invited to spend the first half hour of the day immersed in the pleasures of a good book.

This initiative aims to promote literacy and a love of reading within our community and to ignite a passion for the written word beyond the confines of the classroom.

From timeless classics like Jane Austen's *Emma* to modern YA essentials such as Patrick Ness' "Chaos Walking" series, the selections offer students the opportunity to delve into different themes, genres and eras of literature, enriching their reading experience at a key stage in their academic development.

### Encounters with the Harp

This term, our Senior School music students received a harp workshop in our theatre brought to us by a professional musician for the **Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.** 

Students had the option of sampling the two types of harp that are traditionally found in an orchestra: the pedal harp and the smaller lever harp.

They soon discovered that finding the right posture to play either kind of the instrument is no easy feat, as it requires finding the right balance point to not feel any of the weight instrument on you as you play.

Throughout the session, they received many useful tips on how to further their knowledge of the instrument as well as insights into the working life of a professional musician.



## A Visit to the Saatchi Gallery

To finish off a busy term of exam prep, our GCSE and A level art students were treated to a private tour of the latest exhibition at the Saatchi Gallery – a large scale retrospective of works by world-renowned photographer **Edward Burtynsky.** 

Featuring 94 of Burtynsky's large-format landscape photographs as well as 13 highresolution murals, the exhibition revealed the artist's lifelong study of modernity encroaching on the natural world and got students thinking about the environmental impact of global industrialisation.

Following the tour, students were invited into the museum's private workshop to create murals of their own that will be displayed in the museum alongside other work from touring student groups.

# SAUZE D'OULX FEB 2024 SKI TRIP



Ski trip leaders, Ms Stowe, Ms Phillips, and Mr Mitchell kept a day-to-day diary of this oncein-a-lifetime experience for our students.

#### **Sunday: The Expedition Begins**

"The excitement was palpable as our early morning departure from KPS marked the beginning of our journey. After a smooth flight from Gatwick Airport, we braved the winding roads of Turin and hopped onto a private snowcat that ferried us up the mountain, introducing us to the thrill of night-time mountain rides."

#### Monday: Ski Fit and First Descents

"The day started with ski fittings, ensuring everyone was suited up for the adventure ahead. With lessons under our belts, we conquered a total ski distance of 13 miles across 13 runs, reaching a max speed of 34mph. The slopes of Sauze D'Oulx became our playground, setting the stage for an exhilarating week."









## Tuesday: Skiing Extravaganza and Fun in the Snow



## Wednesday: Confidence Peaks and Sestriere Exploration

"With our confidence soaring, we covered 20 miles on skis, conquering 17 runs at speeds up to 45mph. A change of scenery led us to Sestriere, the site of the 2020 KPS Ski Trip, creating a lovely nostalgic atmosphere. The day ended with a delightful Pizza Night Apres Ski in Sauze, followed by sweet crepes to satisfy our post-ski cravings."

Can in Year 10 recently attended a Grandmaster Chess tournament where he was awarded the title of International Master by the International Chess Federation.

The rank is achieved by averaging a performance rating of at least 2450 over 9 or more games. The field must include at least three International Masters or Grandmasters, and a mix of players from several national federations.

Can had a remarkable showing at the tournament, with an average performance rating of 2455 across 9 matches. He was victorious in 7 out of 9.

# Q&A

#### How does our UCAS programme provide the necessary individual guidance to each student?

All KPS Sixth Form students have one-toone meetings with their personal tutors to advise on their aspirations and intentions for university study. In Year 12, students visit the UCAS Discovery Day exhibition which includes exhibition stalls from all UK universities, as well as a series of seminars on the application process and information on what university courses are like.

During enrichment sessions, I advise Year 12 students about the process of applying, i.e., how to register on UCAS; how to structure your writing on the personal statement questions; and what factors to consider when making your choices. I also hold a weekly workshop where students can drop in to discuss any issues with their applications. In addition, I am always available to students for one-to-one meetings about their university applications, and to give feedback and support for personal statement writing.

# What advice would you give to a prospective student embarking on the UCAS programme?

Any student entering the Sixth Form should try and get a clear picture of their goals for university study as soon as possible through early research. They should choose to study those subjects that they truly enjoy the most, as this will better motivate them to achieve their desired results.

The process of applying to university is not as difficult as it can seem if you have clear goals and are ready to do the work required in good time. The key thing for students to remember is that getting into the course of your dreams will not simply be based on the strength of your application.

It is also about achieving the best possible A level results by developing consistent self-motivated study.
